Course Title: New Testament Survey

Abbreviation: BI 102

Credit Hours: 3

Instructional Hours: 30

Instructor: Dr. Willis C. Newman.

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Catalog description: This introductory course surveys the introductory matters of the New Testament, its historical and cultural context, and a brief summary of each book of the New Testament.

Student Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, the student should be able to:

1. Explain the purpose of the Bible, and a general outline of the New Testament.
2. Understanding the political, cultural, literary, and historical context of the New Testament.
3. Describe the relationship of Jesus Christ and the New Testament.
4. Evaluate special issues such as revelation, inspiration, canonicity, the NT texts, and Synoptic problem.
5. Understand the contribution of major people on development of the New Testament.
6. Identify the nature of the NT church: organization, worship, evangelism, and its spread.
7. Explain various heresies of the early church.
8. Demonstrate an awareness of the themes of various NT books.
9. Be introduced to a selected evangelical bibliography of resources regarding the New Testament

Course Requirements.

Students have 10 weeks to complete the following course requirements. Final grades will be based on the total accumulated points from the examination plus the analysis papers.

1. The reading and understanding of the assigned ebook textbook and readings as explained below. I will email the ebook, *The New Testament: An Outline*, to you by email attachment in pdf format.

You are also required to read from your Bible the Gospel of John, The Acts of the Apostles, Romans, 1 Corinthians, and Hebrews.

2. Examination. Required is one examination. The exam consists of 150 questions worth 1 point each. The examination will be sent to you by email along with the syllabus, and the study materials. You fill out the answers. The exam is open book. On a Word document, type out your answers to each question, then email it back as an attachment to me at drwillisnewman@gmail.com. Here is an example.

4. Write out True or False for any questions that calls for such an answer .

The exam answers can be found in the ebook, *The New Testament: An Outline*, as listed above under requirement one, plus the Bible.

3. Analysis Papers: For each of the five books of the New Testament you are required to read, write a one page essay for each book. Answer the following questions:

- a. What is the book?
- c. Who is the author?
- d. When was it written?
- e. Who was it written to?
- f. What is the theme of the book?
- g. What does the book teach you about God?
- h. What stands out to you personally in the book? As you read through each assigned book, look for something that stands out to you, and that you can apply to your life or ministry. It may be an event, person, theological concept, ministry strategy, psychological insight, or attitude. Write at least one half page on the insight God gives you.

Again, the assigned books are:

- The Gospel of John
- The Acts of the Apostles
- The Letter of Paul to the Romans
- The First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians
- The Letter to the Hebrews

NOTE: Wait until you have completed all five pages, and submit them as an attachment along with your exam to drwillisnewman@gmail.com. Be sure to put your name and the course for each essay.

4. Recommended Reading. The preferred English Bible translations for the student to use is the New American Standard Bible, or the New King James Bible. Recommended study Bibles are The Ryrie Study Bible (Moody Press), and the Nelson Study Bible, NKJV (Thomas Nelson Publishers, Earl Radmacher, general editor). You may use a Bible in your own mother language.

6. Course schedule:

The following schedule will enable you to finish the course in 10 weeks. It is important to stay on schedule so you do not get overwhelmed at the end of the course. These dates are guidelines, not deadlines. **NOTE:** wait until you have completed all the written work and exam, then submit them to me all at once by email attachment.

Weeks one - two: Read/study ebook text pages, 1-40.
Complete portion of examination related to the assigned pages.

Weeks three, four: Read/study ebook text, pages 41-81.
Complete portion of examination related to the assigned pages.

Weeks five, six: Read/study ebook text, pages 82 to end of ebook.
Complete the remainder of the examination.

Weeks seven, 8: Read/study Gospel of John, Acts, and Romans.
Write assigned essays for John, Acts, and Romans.

Week nine, ten: Read/study 1 Corinthians and Hebrews.
Write assigned essays for 1 Corinthians and Hebrews
Complete all unfinished work.

Grading/Method of evaluation: Your grade is determined by adding together all your earned points, then dividing that number by the total points possible. That results in a percentage number. The following chart indicates your grade.
